I am thrilled to share some wonderful news regarding two projects, one about to start and the other just completed.

Broome Senior High School has been selected to receive a generous grant of \$25,000.00 as part of the Schools Upgrade Fund. This funding aims to enhance and



upgrade our school facilities, ensuring the safety of our students and supporting their educational journey as we recover from the disruptions caused by the COVID-19 pandemic in recent years.

Our application for this grant centred around the creation of an outdoor learning environment known as the 'Yawuru Bush Garden Walking Trail' right here at our school. The following is an overview of what this exciting project entails:

- Yawuru Six Seasons Signage: The school premises will be adorned with captivating signage representing the Yawuru six seasons, reflecting the rich cultural heritage of the Yawuru people.
- Tree Identification and Consultation: Each tree along the walking trail will be marked with posts and signage, accompanied by valuable insights from the knowledgeable Yawuru Rangers.
- Resource Development and Publication: We will prepare and publish resources that can be utilised by our students and the wider community, ensuring that everyone can benefit from the educational opportunities provided by the Yawuru Bush Garden Walking Trail.
- Yawuru Language Labelling: In an effort to honour and celebrate the Yawuru language, we will label various buildings and facilities throughout the school premises, with consultation and guidance from the Nyamba Buru Yawuru.

The 'Yawuru Bush Garden Walking Trail' will serve as a living testament to our commitment to cultural inclusivity, environmental education, and providing unique learning experiences for our students. It is a remarkable opportunity to foster a deeper understanding and appreciation of the Yawuru culture and the surrounding natural environment.

Recently, Dr. Tony Buti MLA, Minister for Education, made a significant media announcement highlighting this remarkable initiative. I am thrilled to inform you that we have successfully completed the installation of a cutting-edge solar system, boasting a capacity of 274.45kW. This impressive system comprises 499 solar panels that have been strategically placed on five buildings throughout our school premises.

The introduction of solar panels aligns perfectly with our commitment to sustainable practices and environmental consciousness. Not only will this initiative help us reduce our carbon footprint, but it will also provide invaluable learning opportunities for our students. By witnessing firsthand the benefits of renewable energy and understanding its importance in mitigating climate change, our students will be equipped with the knowledge and skills necessary to become responsible global citizens.


Mamaljan students have been engaging in a variety of communitybased workplace learning experiences where participants can apply the lessons they learn in the classroom to real-world situations.

Missing school means your child misses out on vital information and maintaining learning routines. This can result in a loss of confidence and missing out on forming vital friendships.

Attendance is recorded each day. As a parent or caregiver you are responsible for ensuring your child attends school every day, including sports days unless your child:

- has an unavoidable medical or dental appointment (preferably these should be made after school or during holidays)
- is required to attend a recognised religious holiday
- is required to attend an exceptional or urgent family circumstance (such as attending a funeral)
- is sick, or has an infectious illness.

The open-air exhibit of youth artworks will be on display at Trish Pepper's stunning architecturally designed Tree House this June long weekend.


The exhibition will feature works from Year 7 through to Year 12, including a mix of lino prints, ceramics, painting, recycled cardboard construction and digital photography.



Yes! we generally protect ourselves less when the temperature begins to drop and to our surprise, we find ourselves getting burnt or unintentionally tanned during the winter months. So, what should we do to protect ourselves from the sun in cooler weather? Here are some myths about sun protection in cooler weather.

Myth — Sun protection is not important in cooler weather

Incorrect! Remember heat and UV (ultraviolet) radiation are not the same! It is important to regularly check the UV, especially in the dry season to prevent the surprise of getting burnt even on cooler, cloudy days. If you are heading outside for more than a few minutes and the UV is 3 or above, sun protection is required. For



Myth — There is no difference between SPF 15, 30 and 50 on sunscreen

Incorrect! SPF, or Sun Protection Factor, is the fraction of UV radiation that gets through sunscreen and reaches your skin. So, SPF 50 allows 1/50th (2%) of the UV radiation through, while filtering out 98%, SPF 30 allows 1/30th (3.3%) of the UV through and filters out 96.7% and so on.

When UV is 3 or above be SunSmart


Myth — If I wear sunscreen, I can go without my hat and long sleeves or rashie

Incorrect! Cancer Council WA recommends that a mix of measures to stop sun damage when the UV is 3 or above – SLIP on longer clothes, SLOP on sunscreen, SLAP on a hat with a brim, SEEK shade, SLIDE on sunglasses. Sunscreen is important to

protect your skin, but it's not a suit of armour and no sunscreen works 100%.

Myth — Applying sunscreen once a day is enough

Incorrect! Apply sunscreen 20 minutes before heading outside and reapply at least every two hours. Put on sunscreen again if being active, swimming, or towel-drying. Read the instructions on the pack!
