As the parents of our Year 7 and Year 9 students will be aware, NAPLAN results for 2023 have been released. It is great to see the wonderful results in Year 7 Reading and Year 9 Numeracy, both performing more than one standard deviation above the predicted school mean.

All other areas for both Year 7 and Year 9 fell within one standard deviation of the school mean. I want to thank all staff, from our teaching staff to admin to support staff, for all the work done to get our students to sit the tests and perform their best.




Principal's Pen



SCHOOL UNIFORM

We are very proud of our school and expect our students to wear their school uniform with pride.

All students are required to wear school uniform. This is endorsed by the P&C and the School Board. The uniform is attractive, serviceable and economical and we believe that in wearing it, students develop more pride in themselves and their school. Student dress must comply with accepted standards of health, cleanliness, modesty and safety.

The Broome Senior High School uniform consists of:

- School shirt (Year 7-9 Green, Year 10-12 Blue or White)
- BSHS black shorts Must be at least mid-thigh in length
- Enclosed shoes (e.g. sports shoes). Thongs, Slides, Crocs and Birkenstocks are NOT permitted.
- Leggings, tights and jeans are NOT permitted.

For Physical Education, students are asked to wear:

- · BSHS Sport Shirt
- Shorts at least mid-thigh in length
- Sports shoes

Students must change into their sports uniform for Physical Education classes immediately before and immediately after each lesson.

If, for any reason, students are unable to wear an appropriate uniform to school, they are asked to go to the Library before school to borrow a uniform. Students are asked to leave their clothes behind so they can change again at the end of the day and return the borrowed uniform.

For students who have the incorrect footwear – they are asked to go to Stars who have spare shoes available for the day, and to Clontarf, who also have spare shoes available. Students who are not part of these programs can access Student Services for immediate follow-up.

Shorts, shirts and shoes are all available so there is no reason for students to be wearing an incorrect uniform throughout the day All our school uniform items are available for purchase from Totally Workwear which is located at 5 Haynes Street, Broome Please feel free to contact the school if you have any queries. Aboriginal Cultural advisor Joe Edgar, led the team and shared his wealth of knowledge of hidden springs, tracks and old meeting points along the way. Whilst at Whistle Creek, the boys engaged in fishing, spearing, throw netting, mud crabbing, camp cooking and other activities well away from the illumination of device screens and a busy Broome town.

Around the idle moments of viewing sea eagles swoop, sunsets and tides rolling in, the boys managed to account for a good number of salmon caught. These were promptly iced down and shared with both members of the Bidyadanga community and local families back in Broome.

The highlight of the trip was the skilled display of Mr Jasper "Catfish" John who managed to land an incredible number of these pesky fish.

What has he done to familiarise himself with the fish and will his 'Catfish Curse' continue into 2024?


