On behalf of Broome Senior High School we wish to pay our respects to the late Mrs Lawford-Wolf. She was a highly valued and respected member of the Broome Senior High School community. She was a fantastic role model for all students and I know she made a huge difference to so many lives and will be greatly missed by staff and students.

Mrs Lawford-Wolf trained as a dancer at the Aboriginal Islander Dance Theatre, then continued to perform professionally with Bangarra Dance Theatre in Sydney to build an impressive stage and screen career. She is well known for her films Rabbit-Proof Fence (2002), Bran Nue Dae (2009) and Last Cab to Darwin (2015) and television shows The Circuit (2007 - 2010), 3 Acts of Murder (2009), Little J & Big Cuz (2017) and Mystery Road (2018). Her theatre roles included her one-woman show Ningali (1994-1996), which toured nationally and internationally and earnt her a Green Room Award for Best Actress and a Fringe First Award for Best New Production, *Aliwa* for Company B Belvoir (2001), *Uncle Vanya* (2005) and *Jandamarra* (2008) both for Black Swan Theatre Company.

Mrs Lawford-Wolf was involved in the development of *The* Secret River at the Sydney Theatre Company, narrating its return Sydney season and national tour in 2016, Adelaide Festival performances in 2018 and Edinburgh Festival performances in 2019. Ningali gave a solo performance in the reading of Windmill Baby in 2014, the winner of the 2003 Patrick White Playwright's Award, which she co-wrote with David Milroy, and performed in The Long Forgotten Dream at the Sydney Opera House last year. Mrs Lawford-Wolf was a wonderful mother to Jaden, Rosie, Alexander, William, and Florence, and loving grandmother to Zavia and Mia.

While she was a respected national performer, Mrs Lawford-Wolf always maintained her strong ties to her family and community. She was well-loved at Broome Senior High School where she worked and was an inspiration to many young Indigenous performers.

This term has been a busy and exciting time in Science with the department's new seismograph recording a magnitude 6.6 earthquake off Broome and making the national news. We have had visits from Scitech and have sent some of our brightest students down to the STEM Outreach Program run by the faculty of Science and

Engineering at Curtin





University in Perth. The Outreach program aims to get more



young people interested in science and engineering, with workshops, camps, excursions, incursions and competitions for students and teachers.

At school the lower school students have been learning about Physics, specifically, energy, forces and motion, building cranes out of paper, testing gravity and friction and designing and building homemade vehicles. While the upper school students have been undertaking many experiments and preparing for the end of term exams.

School building update:



The school has completed handover to the builders as the school upgrade project begins. We will have several disruptions over the next 12 months, the first is the impact on the student drop-off area and bike storage at Matsumoto Courts. The bike storage has been relocated to the rear of the gym with bike access from the Haynes Oval gate only. Pedestrian access is still available from the Matsumoto Courts carpark with an alleyway created around the construction site.

The first part of the project will commence with the addition of a commercial kitchen and alfresco cafe to H block and groundworks to the front of the school. Upgrading E block with the addition of two chemistry labs will commence during the upcoming holiday break. We can expect to have this new facility handed over to the school at the end of 2020.
